Do you need a power bank in Argentina?

A power bank is a must-have in Argentina, especially if you plan on exploring the vast landscapes or venturing into areas with limited access to electricity. Consider a waterproof phone case if you plan on doing any water activities, like kayaking in Patagonia or swimming in the Iguazu Falls.

Does Buenos Aires have a power socket?

Argentina's standard voltage is 220 V (50 Hz). And the sockets are type I in Buenos Aires. Travel tip: If you forget to pack a plug adapter, you can locate these in what's called a 'ferreteria'. European Union visitors should pack a Type C or Type F adapter, while Australian/New Zealand travelers will need a Type I adapter.

Guests must ensure that they bring sufficient memory cards and batteries as these may not be readily available. Guests must remember to ask permission before taking a photograph of any local resident.
